

Heritage Around the ICF



Did you know there are five small Islands off the coast of Trapani, Sicily? They are the Egadi Islands. Formica and Maraone are uninhabited; Levenzo and Favignana are the most populated, and Marettimo is a fishing village with few inhabitants. In prehistoric times the Islands were connected to the coast of Sicily and a primitive population lived in caves. Remains have been found



dating back to the Neolithic age. The walls of the caves are covered with wall engrav-

ings and graffiti of human figures, animals and plants. In the year 231 BC, Carthaginians and the Romans battled between the Islands. The Romans claimed victory and the Carthaginians left Sicily. Later the Islands were home to pirates as a hideout and base against passing ships. Today the Islands are visited by tourists wanting to visit the caves and the rugged coast line of the Islands.

Live to Give

Love and Blood: Uncovering Thalassemia

How is it that a majority of Americans have never heard of thalassemia, a chronic blood disorder, yet two million people in the United States carry the genetic trait for the disease? This fact will be the opening statement of our Community Based Service Learning (CBSL) project, which we will present in May 2012. A CBSL project is designed to send students out into the community with the universal goal of improving our world. Choosing a CBSL project takes much thought and consideration, because it not only affects our English and Religion grades, it is required to graduate from Cardinal Newman High School in Santa Rosa, California. We teamed up together in May 2011 due to our shared love of children and common interest in working in a hospital. Our first inclination had been to work with cancer patients, because cancer is a well-known disease and a noble cause, but after many failed attempts at the hospitals and organizations in our area, it became clear this was not our calling. Through the Italian Catholic Federation (ICF) branch in Healdsburg and our mentor, Julie Tomasin, we discovered thalassemia and began researching the details. It was not until our first tour of Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland, and meeting Laurice Levine, that we wholeheartedly wanted to improve the lives of those with Thalassemia.

The name of our project is *Love and Blood: Uncovering Thalassemia*. We are targeting three main areas: fundraising, raising awareness, and most importantly, volunteering at the hospital.

Our first encounter with children who had thalassemia was at the Christmas party, which we helped Laurice plan and execute. Along with making a presentation to St. John's Elementary School, we ran a toy drive, collecting around 200 toys for the party, which was a great achievement. Prior to the event, we had expectations of what patients would be like but no personal experience to develop opinions, which contributed to an open mind. The party was hectic, bustling with volunteers, patients, and families, which aided our comfort level, but we did not develop the deep personal connections we were striving for. We instantly wanted to throw another party ourselves, but upon seeing all the hard work and time Laurice devoted to the Christmas party, we understood that it had to be on a much smaller scale.

Thus far, our Valentine's Day party has been our greatest achievement, smaller yet effective. It has been our first experience organizing something of importance instead of plainly helping someone else organize, which is normal growth for a CBSL project. We could never have imagined the preparation required to throw a party for approximately 35 guests. Our first step in the process was fundraising, which began

Mary's (www.maryspizzashack.com). They offered a percentage of earnings for our cause, so we asked all around and gathered a large group to enjoy pizza with us. After we gave a presentation, the student council at St. Rose Elementary School in Santa Rosa, California, generously donated to our Valentine's party, as well. With our funds, we purchased four tickets to Marine World as a raffle prize, flowerpots for decorating, and many other supplies to ensure that the party ran smoothly. We can still recall the names of the children who made an imprint on us personally and after that party, we truly appreciate that working with thalassemia was the right decision for

We began our effort to spread awareness of thalassemia by going to our elementary schools, St. Rose and St. John's. We made multiple appearances with different age levels through St. John's, including fourth graders who made Valentine's Day cards for the children at that party. The St. Rose seventh graders spoke to Laurice virtually after our presentation by using Skype, allowing them to see and hear about thalassemia firsthand. We have publicized our project all around our high school, Cardinal Newman. We asked the students to bake sugar cookies that could be decorated at the Valentine's Party, hung flyers, and spoke in classrooms. The graphic design classes made Christmas cards for the Christmas party, and we bring along younger volunteers to events in hopes that they will take on our project and carry on our mission of service. The ICF's national charity is thalassemia, so we gave a speech during their Ravioli fundraiser (for thalassemia) concerning our project, spreading awareness not only to our generation, but to others', as well.

Every time we present our project, our audience is completely unaware of the effects of thalassemia. It is shocking to see the number of children and adults alike who are unaware of this disease, but we were in that same category until our project began. Before beginning our project, we were required to write out all our goals for the upcoming months. Now that we are over halfway done, we are amazed by not only the number of goals we have achieved, but also how much they have changed. Our goals adapted to the many things we learned during talks with the patients about their home lives, hearing the true details of thalassemia that research cannot capture. Prior to actually encountering the hospital experience and working with the children, our goals involved brightening their lives and making them happier but now have evolved into being good listeners and stable friends they can confide in. Our naïve expectations of changing their lives were instantly demolished after our first engagement, when we knew they had touched our hearts more than we could ever touch theirs. Simple pleasures such as the bal-

The Painted Turtle Camp is a beautiful 173-acre camp and family-care center in Lake Hughes, California is offering a free six-day camp experience this July-August for children ages 7 to 16 with transfusiondependent thalassemia.

The Painted Turtle provides a year-round, life-changing environment and authentic camp experience for children with chronic and life-threatening illnesses. The camp supports children's medical needs, inspires them to reach beyond their illnesses, and provides care, education and respite for their families.

The Painted Turtle was founded in 1999, opened its gates in 2004 and operates in collaboration with a group of 16 California nonprofit children's hospitals, the Founding Partner Hospitals. It's also a member of the Association of Hole in the Wall Camps founded by actor Paul Newman. Hole in the Wall Camps are considered the finest multi-disease medical camps and family-care centers in

the world. They have served more than 100,000 seriously ill children. Each camp is responsible for its own fundraising and has its own board of directors. In 2006, the Painted Turtle was accredited by the American Camp Association.

Several Thalassemia patients have attended the Painted Turtle Camp these past 3 years. The amount of happiness, confidence and joy it brings them is beyond anything I have seen. I wanted to experience this camp first hand so last summer I volunteered and was the Cabin Counselor for boys ages 7-10. It was a life-changing experience and I intend to return as a counselor again this

While Painted Turtle is free to campers, we at CHO fundraise to be able to provide free transportation to our campers. Without that they would not be able to afford the cost of an airplane ticket. Would you like to sponsor a patient to attend??

Behind the Store: Stories of a First-Generation Italian American Childhood

Vincent Romeo

In Behind the Store: Stories of a First-Generation Italian American Childhood, Vincent Romeo retells the stories of his childhood. The only son of Italian immigrants, Romeo must find his own identity in a world of dichotomies that often leave him confused and lost.

First, Romeo must deal with a father who believes that tough love is the only kind of love to give. He is always critical of his young son, never offering him praise or congratulations. He describes his father as "not noticing or caring. And in the rare times he tried to teach me something, his method was of the critical kind; there was never a compliment . . . never in my whole childhood, I never received one compliment from my father." This leaves the young Romeo insecure and shy to a degree, and he has a hard time making friends. In fact, he states that he never really had a childhood friend: "I . . . felt the need for a friend desperately, the need for someone my own age who would stand by my side.' Afraid of his father's criticism and hot tem-



per, Romeo throws himself in to extracurricular activities at school in order to avoid going home.

His father is also a conflicted man. As Romeo writes, he is "full of contradictions." Based on his experiences in Italy, Romeo's father distrusts the Catholic church and most institutions, and he has an Italian fatalistic view of the world However, he also believes in the American Dream without a critical eye. Romeo states, "America was the right country for him, for it is based on that presumption of innocence that lies at the center of our American lives, an innocence he had. And wasn't it also based on our great dual spirits of self-reliance and generously, both of which were major parts of his character?" His father naively believed in the American dream, and in some ways he achieved a certain amount to success, but as Romeo notes, the country his father loved also limited him by stereotyping him. His father's disappointed ambitions are taken out on his son with constant criticism.

On the other hand, Romeo receives much love from his mother. Throughout the memoir, he praises her and shows that she loved him unconditionally. She, too, lived under difficult circumstances with a demanding and critical husband, prone to "explosive anger." However, she showed her young son the love and attention he could not get from his father. His mother is the one that pays attention to him, showing him how to cook, spending time with him, telling him stories. He relates that he "loved hearing Mom tell of her childhood, of her dreams, of what life had been like when she and my father first married." His mother also cooked the traditional Italian meals he comes to associate with her love, and each chapter is followed by a delicious recipe, one for Italian Sausage, one for Calabrian Orange Salad, another for biscotti, and many more, that represent the love Romeo received from his mother. However, Romeo is too honest of a writer to draw a portrait of his mother that does not include an honest look at her. He explains that she worried to excess, often preventing his father from achieving his dreams and overprotecting her children from imagined fears. She also gave into the demands of her husband and remained passive in the face of his anger even though she also had unrealized ambitions.


As Romeo acknowledges, his parents mold him into the man he is, and he must come to terms with his father's uncompromising and disapproving ways. Romeo realizes that although his father was never able to express his approval, he never-the-less was at times proud of his son. Romeo finds out that his father was devoted to watching the television shows in which he acts. The author writes later in the book that "I do think that sometimes I pleased my father, though he would never admit it." And as the family gathers around his dying father, Romeo asks him "Do you love us?" To which, he immediately nodded yes. Romeo also sees his mother grow stronger as she grows older, standing up to her husband and speaking her mind more. While one gets the sense that pain of Romeo's childhood isn't totally healed, the author has come to terms with it. In a sense, the book reads as an exorcism of the author's demons, but as he comes to understand his parents, he realizes that he loves his family, and many fond memories fill the book, memories of holidays with relatives and large Italian family dinners, and memories of his loving grandmother. He finishes the book by writing. "I would tell the family stories of my father with humor and love. And I, too, would come to see the beauty of recognizing the world for what it is and how that is an endless joy.'

Besides his parents, Romeo describes many colorful characters in his book. He describes his parents friends, his many relatives, and the neighbors in his Italian community. It is through these descriptions that the reader comes to understand what it meant to be Italian and American in the 1950s. We learn of their ambitions, disappointments, strengths, and weaknesses, and their lives are more complex than they first appear.






