Grand President's Monthly Message





Halloween?

How did Halloween, with its witches, gremlins and goblins, get its start?

Halloween was really a religious day of penance, fast and abstinence. For years before the Vatican II Council in 1962, the day before major feasts days such as Christmas, Easter, the Ascension, All Saints Day, the Immaculate Conception and others, were days of fast, abstinence and penance. The motive was to do penance in preparation for the celebration of the Feast on the following day. Thus, the day before All Saints Day- Holy Eve, All Hallow's Eve, and eventually Halloween- was a day of penance and fast and abstinence.

Today, the since the Vatican II council, the vigil of these feasts days no longer

requires penance. The goal now is to prepare for the feasts in a positive way by prayer and good works.

All Saints Day is a feast honoring the saints in heaven and the saints on earth. (One does not have to die to be a saint. Think about it. I think all would agree, Mother Teresa was a

saint before she died!)

Somehow, throughout the years, All Hallow's Eve, became Halloween; witches, gremlins, goblins, scary costumes, trick or treat, jack-o-lanterns. The same is true of Easter with Easter Bunnies and Christmas with Santa Claus. This is the commercialization of religious feasts for people to enjoy whether they are religious or not.

Believers look forward to All Saints Day to rejoice with the people of God and to celebrate ALL SAINTS in heaven and on earth. So, Holy Eve (Halloween) is a day of spiritual preparation for a big feast day, with or without the

Today, we are still called to light a fire. We are called to light the fire of faith in our parishes and communities. And I believe this needs to remain the focus of our organization.

I have noticed over the years that strong branches have strong ties to their parishes and communities. They assist their pastors in all kinds of ways. They hold fundraiser dinners, they host coffee and donuts for the parish on Sunday morning. They act as ushers and greeters at masses, and they make lunches for RCIA meetings. Large or small, these acts are appreciated by our pastors and keep that fire of faith lit. They are the flames of faith in our parishes that make us a relevant and vital part of parish life.

So, I am encouraging each of you to return to your branches and to encourage them to find ways to connect with parish life. Or if you feel that your branch is already well integrated into your parish, to find new ways to connect to your parish or community that spread the fire of faith.

To fill us with this fire, Karen Rossi led us at convention in a chorus of Here I am Lord.

It is among my strongest beliefs and values that, as Christians, we are called to extend the banquet table, to pull up extra chairs, and to invite all to join us for a meal. Christ calls us to extend hospitality, kindness and generosity to all people. He reminds us that all people have gifts to offer. Sure, it might take a bit of looking to find the gifts in some, but all people without exception have something to offer. And the federation should be the place that others can come to find friendship and fellowship and where they can find Christ's love in our hospitality.

Moreover, when deciding on an issue in our branches or at the Central Council, I think we need to ask ourselves, "Are we uniting or are we dividing?" If we are uniting people, then we are doing the work of the Lord. We are extending the banquet table. And this will be a guiding principle of my decision making this year.

Finally, I would like to note that at our recent Central Council meeting, this fine group of executives hit the ground running and they are eager and ready to take on the challenges of the upcoming year. With that in mind, I have already made committee chair assignments.

Lauren Kilcullen will chair the Apostolate committee; Bob Basuino, as Grand Parliamentarian, will chair the By-Laws

Committee as well as continue as Ways and Means chair; Rose Jarrett will continue to chair the Convention Committee; Deborah Rodondi will chair the Mentor program with assistance from Andy Pappani with struggling branches; Mike Rossi will continue to chair the Expansion Committee; Franklyn Lopes, Jr. as Grand Treasurer, will chair the Finance Committee; Teresa Helfand will chair the Gifts of Love Committee; Denise Antonowitz will chair the Heritage Committee; Pat Mages will chair the Membership Committee; Lisa Crudo will chair the Hospitalization and Scholarship Committees; Ken Marshall will Chair the Live to Give committee; Leonard Zasoski will chair the Public Relations Committee; Steve Fuentes has kindly agreed to chair the Task Force Committee; and Leonard Rossi will chair the Workshop Committee.

With their years of experience and dedication in the Federation, these will be great chairpersons to lead the ICF in the upcoming year.

If you would like to assist a committee or have any ideas for them, please contact these chairpersons. I am sure they would appreciate it.

We have already started work on many exciting and new ideas to strengthen the federation. Committee chairs and I have discussed changes to the Bollettino to make it a publication to help in new member recruitment. We have discussed new parishes and areas where the ICF can expand, plans to help with member retainment, changes to branch by-laws to lessen the burden on branches to fulfill their offices and responsibilities, and workshops to assist branches in leadership development.

One plan that I am most excited about is the establishment of a national branch, a revitalization of Branch 67. This branch will be open to those who do not live in an area that the federation currently serves. This will be a branch that will have a largely virtual presence but that will have its base at St. Peter's Church in Los Angeles. St. Peter's was founded in 1904 to care for the spiritual and social needs of new Italian immigrants who came to America, so it seems a fitting home for our new national branch. The current members of branch 67 are excited to extend their hospitality to new members, uniting members from different regions in the country. Years later, when I came back to my faith, I learned it was the Holy Spirit that gave me my MOL, by putting Professor B in my young life, and help the 'adult' me find my way back. The Lord sure has some weird ways of getting things done.

To continue, I have been in the restaurant business, gone to culinary arts and chef school, and then worked in the produce industry. Now I am a Legal Assistant and Currier for several lawyers, and trying to expand my business. Anyone with ideas for me, please see me later.

As long as I am able, I will continue to stay involved in the ICF, the Knights of Columbus, and Saint Vincent's, and look for new ways to help with new humanitarian endeavors.

I wish my Shannon was here tonight to experience this evening, but she is at home getting ready for another round of chemo. We have been fighting Leukemia 2 years now.

With that, let's all lift the glass of your choice to Saint Pope John the XXIII, the people's pope and saint, and to the Italian Catholic Federation Family, that we all may answer the cry of affliction and denounce all forms of prejudice.

And may the Holy Spirit continue to guide us with wisdom and humility so that we all shine by example to those we encounter in our daily lives.

The Story of Father Eusebio Francisco Kino

Father Kino was born in the village of Segno, now part of the town of Predaia in Northern Italy. He entered into the religious life after a grave illness. Father Kino's role in the Southwest area is profound and he is one of two historical figures representng Arizona at the Capitol Building in Washington DC.

Originally desiring for a mission to Asia, Father Kino was instead assigned to the new world. Kino did not take this diversion as anything but a challenge to explore the great unexplored wild lands of the Sonoran Desert.

Kino was responsible for many of the first maps of the region which were considered the standard. He was actually the responsible party for the naming of a little know geographic feature of our region. You may have heard of it...The Colorado River.

Kino was not only interested is exploring these lands, but he was key in teaching many native people agriculture, and ranching. So key, he is credited with the extreme economic growth of the area. Even more incredible was his believe that we are all God's children to be cherished not separated by race or station that was commonplace in those times.

Now 400 years later Father Kino is revered in both the United States and in Mexico for his work with bringing Catholicism to the region along with the immeasurable contribution to the development of the region and his other scholastic studies.














Saturday at the Convention

Owing to medical advances, individuals with Cooley's anemia are getting older. Where the age range used to be 15, more and more are living to adulthood. When Laurice was born, she wasn't expected to live past 13. Now the age expectancy is upward of 50. The gene is carried by 7% of the world's population. Italy leads the way in Cooley's anemia research and we here at the ICF are doing are part to keep the momentum going.




